## THE LATE PTE CASH J.C<sup>1</sup>.: TRIBUTE FROM ENEMY P.O.W

The funeral of **Pte**. John Charles Cash of the Pioneer Corps<sup>2</sup>, whose death as the result of an accident in Scotland, took place at the Congregational Church, Tewkesbury on Saturday. A beautiful collection of flowers included wreaths from the officers of deceased's unit, from the neighbours at Quinton and one from enemy Prisoners of War.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cash of Howells Road and was killed in a motor cycle accident in "an endeavour to avoid two pedestrians"<sup>3</sup>. He died of a fractured skull and his funeral service was

held in Tewkesbury, at the Congregational Chapel in Barton Street. His widow lived in Quinton with their three bereaved children. Besides Charles, Mr. and Mrs. Cash had two other sons in the armed forces.

Praised by his captive charges; noted how he gave up his life to save others and one of three brothers in the armed forces, brought up in Tewkesbury: why is his name omitted from those honoured on our War Memorial?
