



Souvenirs

The Tewkesbury Goblet designed and hand made by a Cotswold silversmith specially for the Festival, is $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches high, and made in sterling silver, hallmarked in London and engraved with the Festival symbol. A limited issue of 850 is being made, and a certificate of authentication will be forwarded with the goblet showing the number of the goblet, the number also being engraved on the base of the goblet. Cost of the goblet, together with presentation case, is £35; sets of six in a specially made case, £200.

Spode Plate. The Spode Company are manufacturing a special plate to commemorate the Festival. The plate is approximately 10 inches in diameter and shows the Coats of Arms of the Borough of Tewkesbury, Lord FitzHamon, King Edward IV, Edward Prince of Wales, the See of Worcester and the See of Gloucester. Surrounding each Coat of Arms is the Lancastrian Red Rose and the Yorkist White Rose embodied in the bursting sun. Cost of the Spode Plate, inclusive of postage, etc., is £16, including presentation case and a certificate of authentication signed by His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, K.G., P.C., G.C.V.O., High Steward of the Borough of Tewkesbury. A limited issue of 1,350 plates, each individually numbered.

Tewkesbury Town Sword, approximately 36 inches in length, the blade is etched with buildings of historic interest in Tewkesbury; the pommel is of 18 carat gold plate and has a rosewood handle. The shellguard carries the Coat of Arms of the Borough. The price of the Sword is £16·25, plus postage. The Sword mounted on a mahogany plaque ready for display is £20·50, plus postage in a non-purchase tax area, but is subject to purchase tax of $37\frac{1}{2}p$ in the United Kingdom if mounted on plaque.

Battle of Tewkesbury Sword, approximately 42 inches in length, with the pommel and crossguard 18 carat gold plated. The blade bears illustrations relating to historical figures in the War of the Roses. The sword is on a polished mahogany plaque bearing a description of the trophy. Together with the sword will be a numbered certificate/history sheet; edition limited to 250. The cost of the sword when shipped overseas to a non-tax area is £55, plus postage. Within the United Kingdom the price is £55.75 and £3.50 delivery charge.

Tewkesbury Town Poignard and Scabbard is 16 inches in overall length with pommel and crosspiece in 18 carat gold plate. The Coat of Arms of the Borough is on the front of the pommel. The grip is of simulated ivory. Etched upon the 11-inch blade is an illustration of a place of historic interest in Tewkesbury. The scabbard is hand-sewn leather with 18 carat gold mounts. The cost of poignard and scabbard is £16-50, plus postage; the cost of the poignard without the scabbard is £8-75, plus postage.
